Carnegie Science Center's Mental Health Exhibition Closes Soon

Exhibit helps to tackle back-to-school anxiety with mental health knowledge and tips through Sun., Aug. 17

PITTSBURGH, **Aug. 1, 2025** – Help to shake off back-to-school jitters at Carnegie Science Center with the "<u>Mental Health: Mind Matters</u>" exhibition before it closes on Sun., Aug. 17. Gather the family to explore worry and coping methods through immersive displays, personal stories, and engaging activities that bring the science of mental health to life.

Included with general admission to the Science Center, the trilingual (English, Spanish, and French) exhibition is packed with powerful, science-backed, and stigma-breaking experiences, many of which will help both students and caregivers prepare for the upcoming school year. In the exhibition, visitors will:

- Engage in interactive activities that help recognize and regulate emotions, from expressive art to movement exercises.
- Experience mental health challenges firsthand by stepping into the world of a family navigating the impact of depression.
- Encounter the difficulty of engaging in a conversation while wearing noise-distorting headphones that simulate auditory hallucinations.

- Shred worries in a "Worry Shredder," a symbolic way to release stress and anxiety.
- Explore the history of mental health and how perceptions and treatments have evolved.
- Listen to real stories from individuals living with mental health conditions, which helps to foster empathy and awareness.
